<p>PROP 1</p> <p>Vote Passage - Majority Vote (50% + 1)</p>	<p>AUTHORIZES \$6.38 BILLION IN BONDS TO BUILD MENTAL HEALTH TREATMENT FACILITIES FOR THOSE WITH MENTAL HEALTH AND SUBSTANCE USE CHALLENGES; PROVIDES HOUSING FOR THE HOMELESS.</p> <p>LEGISLATIVE STATUTE.</p> <p>Amends Mental Health Services Act to provide additional behavioral health services. Fiscal Impact: Shift roughly \$140 million annually of existing tax revenue for mental health, drug, and alcohol treatment from counties to the state. Increased state bond repayment costs of \$310 million annually for 30 years. PP	<p>HUNTINGTON PARK STREET PARKING, PUBLIC SAFETY, CLEAN NEIGHBORHOODS IMPROVEMENT MEASURE. To provide Huntington Park residents access to overnight parking, reduce 9-1-1 emergencies response times by preventing parking violations that block streets and make it difficult for ambulances, fire engines, police, paramedics and other emergency personnel to navigate city streets; improve trash collection and street sweeping services, shall Huntington Park be directed to conduct a citywide study to develop, implement and enforce a parking permit program on public streets to improve residents quality of life. CC	<p>Term limits for members of the City Council. Shall the ordinance limiting the number of four-year terms served by members of the Huntington Park City Council be limited to four consecutive terms prospectively? The ordinance provides that no person shall serve more than four consecutive terms in city council and any person who has served four terms may reset the four-term cap after abstaining from running in one general municipal Election?
